#### THE FULL VALUE AGREEMENT & NORTHMEN DRIVE

Working with the developing adolescent can sometimes be challenging. In an attempt to focus our efforts and, more importantly, to help our students through adolescence and prepare them for years to come, we have developed a couple key initiatives over the years. The Full Value Agreement has been in place in Petoskey Middle School since the 1980's, and it continues to serve us well. We expect everyone in our school to follow the three tenets: Work as a Team, Be Safe (physically and emotionally), and Speak Up. The Full Value Agreement has since grown across our district, and is even utilized in other school districts. These are our social norms, which we expect our students to utilize every day.

Northmen DRIVE embodies a social-emotional skill set that we teach in conjunction with the Full Value Agreement. Our goal is for students to learn to navigate life with **D**etermination, **R**espect, and **I**ntegrity, to know how and when to appropriately and effectively use their **V**oice, all while practicing **E**mpathy. Our staff utilizes homeroom time to teach, discuss, and practice these important life skills.

The motto, "We have NORTHMEN DRIVE" serves as the basis of our Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) system and is written on every expectation poster in our school building. This motto is displayed along with specific expectations on posters throughout the building, reminding students and staff to Be Safe, Work as a Team, and Speak Up. We strive to remind students to not only do their best, but to be their best selves. We want them to have the drive to work hard toward success in the challenges they face.

We feel it is important to remind the developing adolescent and develop these DRIVE skills,

while also Working as a Team, Speaking Up, and Being Safe. I bring this up in hope that we can continue to be on the same page as we partner to help your child and every other child in our school.

As always, we are honored to partner with you in helping your child learn and grow. It is a responsibility we do not take lightly.

#### 6TH GRADE PARENTS - IMMUNIZATIONS REQUIRED FOR 7TH GRADE

#### **SOCIAL MEDIA - Please Consider the Risks**

On Friday, February 24, we hosted Max Stossel, a nationally renowned speaker on all things social media. Max spoke to our 7th and 8th grade students, as well as hosted a session for parents that same evening. His message was pretty clear. Social media can be dangerous. The more knowledgeable adults are about this, the better. Here are some resources he asked that we share with parents.

It is important to remember that the middle school years are often difficult for children. These years are dominated by significant physical and emotional change, making decisions, relationships, and just about everything else difficult. Every generation has had to deal with the challenges of adolescence, but now our youth have an added challenge —social media. Here are just a couple reasons social media is hard for students.

Young adolescents (and even adults) often compare themselves to others. Combine this with the phenomenon of peers constantly projecting the best possible version of themselves online, and it is easy to see how social media can negatively impact a child's self-esteem.

Social media is a great communication tool, but it is not a substitute for face-to-face conversations. Too many times we see social media replacing these essential real conversations, which is a skill necessary for students to become successful adults.

More than ever before, teens are getting more feedback from their peers as compared to older generations. Because of this, it is important that children spend more time with their parents. They really need to get advice from you (and even their grandparents) because adolescents are overloaded with peer feedback that often comes from social media outlets. As a school, we are constantly trying to find avenues to deal with this issue. Because of the number of conflicts that we are having that involve social media, we have had speakers come in and the consequences associated with the virtual world.

See the information below for some additional reasons parents should consider when deciding on how social media fits for their child. This information is not meant to be judgmental for allowing the use of social media. Rather, it is meant to help you consider the potential consequences for its use.

#### "Ten Reasons Middle Schoolers Don't Need Social Media"

- 1. Social media was not designed for children. A tween's underdeveloped frontal cortex can't manage the distraction nor the temptations that come with social media use.
- 2. You can not teach the maturity that social media requires. I hear parents say that they want to teach their child to use social media appropriately, but their midbrains are not developed yet. Like trying to make clothes fit that are way too big, children will use social media inappropriately until they are older and it fits them better.



- 3. Social media is an entertainment technology. It does not make your child smarter or more prepared for real life or a future job.
- 4. It is not necessary for healthy social development. It is entertainment attached to a marketing platform extracting personal information and preferences from your child, not to mention hours of their time and attention.
- 5. A tween's "more is better" mentality is a dangerous match for social media. Social media encourages them to overdo their friend connections like they tend to overdo other things in their lives. Does anyone have thousands of friends?
- 6. Social media is an addictive form of screen entertainment. Like video game addiction, early use can set up future addiction patterns and habits.
- 7. Social media replaces learning the hard social "work" necessary for success. The use of social media greatly lessens opportunities requiring children to practice dealing face-to-face with their peers, a skill they need to master to be successful in real life.
- 8. Social media can cause teens to lose connection with family. They view "friends" as their foundation and since the brain is still being formed, they need healthy family attachment more than with their peers. It is just as important now as when they were preschoolers.
- 9. Social media use represents lost potential for teens. The teen's brain development is operating at peak performance for learning new things. Studies show that it is nearly impossible for them to balance it all and teens waste too much time and too much of their brain in a digital world.
- 10. Do any of us wish we had started earlier?

#### **DROP OFF / PICK UP PROCEDURES**



The parent drop off and pick up procedure is an extremely important process that everyone must abide by. There has been an article in this newsletter for the past several months explaining the procedure, but it is important to review for the safety of all of our children. Parents should drop off and pick up students on the right side of the loop. The left side should be used for moving forward and is a no parking area. If you need to park for an extended time, please use the parking lot. It is also important to not obstruct Northmen Drive. Please see the picture below. The school parking lot is usually extremely busy and congested before and after school, and it will likely be an even greater challenge this year. To help maintain safety and traffic flow, we ask that you use the parent loop and parking lot accordingly. Also, remember that there is an alternate drop off location on the PHS side of Northmen Drive. Students dropped off there can walk to the Middle School through the tunnel.

No vehicles other than school buses are allowed in the bus loop. We appreciate your help in keeping our students safe.
