SOCIAL MEDIA

"Kids these days..." is often a topic of conversation for many adults, especially among parents of school-aged children. I would argue that children are no different today, but the tools available to them have most definitely changed. One of the greatest obstacles adults have to overcome is teaching our children to use these tools appropriately since we did not grow up using them. This makes giving the "when I was your age..." talk difficult to have as it relates to the use of social media. The effects of social media on the developing mind continue to show mostly negative results. Many argue that while online teens tend to use poor communication skills, are bombarded with misinformation, and do not fully understand the ramifications of their actions. Teens often focus on getting as many "likes," which unfortunately helps fulfill social validation for which teens so intensely yearn. Social media usage also does not allow students to escape from their peers. This constant connection and pressure can lead to unintended consequences, such as anxiety, sadness, and depression.

If social media is permitted, we have to instill boundaries in terms of it's usage. According to the <u>Pew Research Center</u>, 95% of teens report having access to a cell phone, while 46% say they are online almost constantly, doubling since 2014-15. Because social media consists mostly of peer-to-peer interactions, children too often do not learn how to utilize this tool effectively and appropriately.

As a school, we are acutely aware (as best as we can be) of the multitude of online and social media issues students deal with both outside and inside of school. This is one of the many reasons we do not allow students to carry a phone on their person during the school day. In December of 2021, there was a community presentation titled "Social Media: A common sense approach," for parents of teens in which Trooper Corey Hebner addressed the topic of social media. You can still access this presentation by clicking here. Mr. Hebner provides a plethora of information for parents. We are also working on ways to continue to educate students about the responsibilities and dangers of online activity.

We encourage all parents to seriously consider the ramifications of social media usage before allowing your child to log on. If you do decide to allow social media, please monitor your child's online activity closely (they are most likely doing more than you think), and talk to them about your expectations. Tell them not to post or send something online that they wouldn't say to someone's face, not to post or send anything that is hurtful, and not to post or send anything that they wouldn't want their grandparent to see. Again, a simple conversation with your child can go a long way in this regard.


By working together on this issue, we can help our children learn how to appropriately navigate this powerful media.

PMS SUPPORT STAFF NEEDED

Do you want to work with a highly functioning team while making a difference in the lives of children? If you or someone you know are interested in helping students become successful in the classroom and beyond, please consider applying for one of our open aide positions at Petoskey Middle School. We have a very welcoming and professional staff. This is a necessary and rewarding position, and it follows the school calendar.



Our district has recently raised our Aide pay to \$14.50 an hour, and steps are available for longevity. There is also an opportunity to earn a \$500 bonus in December and again in June, pending attendance requirements are met. These positions also include ten leave days to use throughout the year. ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES AT PMS

Students at Petoskey Middle School have the opportunity to participate in many academic enrichment activities throughout the year. Topics of study change during the year and cover all subject areas including activities such as the Social Studies Olympiad, Future City: Research, Design & Build Science Competition, Scripps National Spelling Bee, Math Counts and the Crooked Tree Writing Contest. Currently, several students are preparing for the America & Me "My Michigan Hero" writing contest. Students are selected based on their academic performance, teacher recommendation and interest in a topic. The groups are voluntary and change frequently based on student interests. In addition, many enrichment activities are posted on the Middle School Enrichment website, which is open to all students who are looking for additional options to extend their learning.

HARBOR SPRINGS FESTIVAL OF THE BOOK SCHOOL VISIT

On September 23, the Harbor Springs Festival of the Book sent authors into area schools to talk about books, writing, and the creative process. Our students were able to hear from Newbery Award Winner Katherine Applegate about her new book *Odder*, Drs. Michael G. Long and Yohuru Williams about their book *Call Him Jack: The Story of Jackie Robinson, Black Freedom Fighter* and Laekan Zea Kemp about her book *Omega Morales and the Legend of La Lechuza.* These visits bring books to life for students and give real-world examples of the writing skills students are learning in the classroom. BEHAVIOR AT PHS ATHLETIC EVENTS

We have been asked by the PHS athletic department to address our middle school students' behavior at athletic events. If a student attends an athletic event, they are expected to watch the event. We have been having issues with students trying to get into the games without paying, handing tickets through the fence to avoid paying, etc. If a student continues to be a behavior issue at an athletic event, they will be asked to leave. We would appreciate it if you would not leave your child unattended at an athletic event and talk to them about behavior beforehand.

Immunizations

State law requires that ALL students entering 7th grade be up-to-date on their immunizations in order to attend school. If you wish to obtain a waiver, you must get one through the Health Department. If you have any questions, call the Health Department at 347-6014.

Medications

If your student has prescription or non-prescription medicine that they take during the school day, a medication form must be completed for each medication and the medicine dropped off by an adult to the school office. A new form must be filled out each school year.


SPORTS PHYSICALS

DROP OFF PROCEDURES

The parent drop off and pick up procedure is an extremely important process that everyone must abide by. There has been an article in this newsletter for the past several months explaining the procedure, but it is important to review for the safety of all our children. Parents should drop off and pick up students on the right side of the loop. The left side should be used for moving forward and is a no parking area. If you need to park for an extended time, please use the parking lot. It is also important to not obstruct Northmen Drive. Please see the picture below. The school parking lot is usually extremely busy and congested before and after school, and it will likely be an even greater challenge this year. To help maintain safety and traffic flow, we ask that you use the parent loop and parking lot accordingly. Also, remember that there is an alternate drop off location on the PHS side of Northmen Drive. Students dropped off there can walk to the Middle School through the tunnel.

No vehicles other than school buses are allowed in the bus loop. We appreciate your help in keeping our students safe.

1- Application (PLUS making online deposits) website: Petoskey.familyportal.cloud

Click register (By registering an account, you will be able to complete an online application and have the functionality to make deposits through this system. At this time, this will be the only way to make deposits online. eFunds will be up and running for deposits in the next few weeks or months.)

New protocol for deposits being dropped off at elementary schools:

Checks will need to be in a sealed envelope with your child's first and last name on the outside of the envelope.

During the first week of school, your building Principal, Secretary or your child's teacher will let your child know the new protocol when bringing in food service deposits to the school.
