#### **Principal's Message**

#### Lightbulb Moments:

Students are engaging in our English Language Arts (ELA) curriculum including writing letters, exploring poetry, listening to and connecting with fiction and non-fiction text. Foundational skills such as recognizing letters/ sounds, high frequency words, spelling patterns and grammar concepts are being learned. We focus on reading and spelling accuracy, fluency, vocabulary development and comprehension consistently throughout the week. Consider asking your child what she or he read or thought about today during their literacy instruction.

During math instruction, depending on their grade level, students are exploring numbers to 10, sums and differences to 10, place value/counting and comparing number to 1,000, place value and problem solving units of measurement, unit conversions, multi-digit whole number and fraction operations. Consider asking your child what they explored and are still curious about learning in math.

We also continue to focus on social-emotional learning and behavioral expectations through implementation of our Full Value Agreement and Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports. Explicitly teaching, practicing and reinforcing expectations helps students know our routines and supports our aim to Work as a Team, Be Safe, and Speak Up. Consider asking your child about the Full Value Agreement and what is expected of them in their classroom, hallway and playground. You may see an Ottawa TEAM Ticket at home which shows that your child was caught being a TEAM player by exemplifying our Full Value Agreement in action.

#### **Tiered System of Support:**

We set aside 60 minutes every day (30 minutes for ELA and 30 minutes for math) as part of our tiered system of support in which every student engages in pre-teaching, re-teaching, practice or extension activities based on his or her needs. Additional staff joins the classroom teacher during these times.

Our beginning of the year literacy and math assessment window has drawn to a close. This information helps us adjust and target our instruction according to your child's learning needs for classroom instruction and/or during our tiered system of supports. We continue to utilize work samples and classroom assessments. Please sign up for a conference with your child's teacher (codes included in this and teacher newsletters). A strong home-school partnership makes a world of difference for your child.

#### Safety Reminders:

- Drop off is at the sidewalk (not on the grass near the Kindergarten doors); You are still welcome to park in a designated spot and walk our child to their cohort door
- If you need to exit your vehicle to assist your child, please park in a designated spot so that traffic flow remains efficient

# Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease

Our region, community, and school is experiencing an increased rate of Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease.

Hand, foot, and mouth disease is a common mild childhood illness which is caused by a moderately contagious virus. It typically affects children under the age of five, but older students and adults may also become infected.

Initial symptoms of hand, foot, and mouth disease include fever, poor appetite, general discomfort, and often a sore throat. Approximately two days after onset of initial symptoms, painful sores develop in the mouth. They begin as small, red spots that often become ulcers. A non-itchy rash with flat or raised red spots with a blister-like appearance develops one to two days after initial symptoms begin. The rash typically appears on the hands and feet. Most people recover without complications within seven to ten days. If your child exhibits the above symptoms, keep him or her home to reduce the spread of the virus.

Hand, foot, and mouth disease is spread from person-to-person by direct contact with nose and throat discharges, saliva, fluid from blisters, or stool of the infected person. Surfaces contaminated with these substances may also become a source of infection, so thorough cleaning of surfaces can reduce the spread of hand, foot, and mouth disease. Additionally, frequent and thorough hand washing helps to prevent the spread of infection. At school we are disinfecting surfaces and providing frequent hand washing opportunities. At home, please wash your hands and your child's hands after diapering or assisting with toileting and before eating or preparing food.
